
APIRG (The Alberta Public Interest Research Group) is a valuable resource based at the University of Alberta.



Projects

APIRG ALMANAC

In 2020-2021 we created the second edition of the APIRG ALMANAC. The ALMANAC is a dayplanner for folks who care about local art, community organizing, and social justice. The project was organized by our volunteer APIRG ALMANAC Creation Collective. The ALMANAC carried on the legacy of the first ALMANAC, which was created by Ryanna Brattlan and Joy Olagoke, and included community resources guides for both on and off campus, creative content from students and local artists, anti-oppressive horoscopes and more! We distributed 200 copies through public pick-up points at community spaces including The Nook Cafe and Intent Coffee, as well as through home delivery and mail.


LIBRARY COMMITTEE

This year our volunteer-based Library Committee guided and maintained our library activities. The committee grew to 11 members this year, who actively guided the aspects of the library's activities - including book intake, cataloguing, distribution, library policy and outreach! Additionally, this year the Library Committee started researching and creating policy for the APIRG Archive.

AWOL 2020

AWOL (A Week of Liberation) is our annual fall event series aimed at welcoming students and community to the new school year, and building community, knowledge and power for the futures we want and need. In September 2020 we hosted a mini, virtual AWOL featuring two rad events – Just(ice) for Laughs, our annual comedy show, and Why Reconciliation Died, a talk with Veronica Fuentes about Indigenous and Black land justice and sovereignty movements on the prairies. Thank you to everyone involved!

ANNUAL GENERAL MEETING Our 2020 Annual General Meeting (AGM) was held online on November 19th, 2020 through Zoom. This was the first time we held the AGM online and it was well attended!

INTERSECTIONS OF QUEER SERIES 2020 In 2020, the annual Intersections of Queer Symposium transformed into the Intersections of Queer Series. Together with the Landing, the Community Social Work Team and Rainbow Alliance for Youth Edmonton, we transformed IQS into its new form of an online workshop series. IQS brings 2SLGBTQ+ communities together in amiskwaciwâskahikan (Edmonton) to share knowledge and build connections through programming that is grounded in accessibility and community needs and desires.

In 2020 we hosted three Intersections of Queer Series events online. In June Gabe Castilloux and Pilar Roqueni kicked off IQS with a fantastic Grant Writing workshop, personalized to projects and needs of attendees. In August Kai Bureau joined IQS to share about the history of the term "Two Spirit" as it relates to Treaty 6 and surrounding areas through the Two Spirit Identities and Resurgence workshop. And in December London Blackwood, Freya Selander, Michelle Kennedy, Jason Garcia, and Cheyenne Mihko Kihêw shared conversation on resilience and creating a sense of radical belonging through the Queer & Fat Voices: Resilience and Radical Belonging panel.



One of the main focuses of APIRG is to provide funding and support for Working Groups.

Working Groups are autonomous collectives of U of A students and community members who come to us with their ideas and passion for change.

They work together on an issue that falls within the APIRG mandate, with a focus on research, events, actions, publications, or other diverse activities. CANADIAN STUDENTS FOR SENSIBLE **DRUG POLICY - EDMONTON**

Working Group since Fall 2018

Canadian Students for Sensible Drug Policy is a grassroots network of youth and students who are concerned about the negative impact our drug policies have on individuals and communities. We consider problematic drug use in society primarily a health issue rather than a criminal justice issue, and we advocate for appropriate responses to reduce and prevent harm from drug use. We mobilize our members to participate in the political process at all levels, pushing for sensible policies to achieve a safer and more just future, while combating counterproductive drug policies, particularly those that directly harm young people. CSSDP works alongside other organizations and campaigns to support harm reduction, evidence-based legislation, and drug policy reform on local, national and international levels.

COVID-19 EMERGENCY RESPONSE FUNDING RECIPIENTS

In May of 2020, the COVID-19 Emergency Response Funding stream was launched in response to the unprecedented impacts of the pandemic. This grant stream provided one-time funding to support direct action, mutual aid, and advocacy projects led by students, working groups, and community members in response to the COVID-19 pandemic. The COVID-19 Emergency Response Funding stream funded 7 events and projects up to \$3000 each.

COVID

APIRG programming and day-to-day operations have continued to change in response to changing circumstances around the COVID-19 pandemic. During the 2020-2021 year, we closed our office and moved to remote work, continued holding meetings online, and adopted our programming to online delivery.

Through our microgrant funding stream, we provide up to \$150 on a rolling basis to small-scale events and projects undertaken exclusively by undergraduate students at the University of Alberta.
