Past, Present, and Future of Campus Land

The University of Alberta North campus is on Papaschase First Nation land. The Papaschase Nation was forcibly removed from this land so that settler homes and the university could be built.

Today, people of the Papaschase, Cree, Blackfoot, Metis, Nakota Sioux, Iroquois, Dene, Anishinaabe, Inuit, and all Indigenous nations are students, staff and community members on campus. Their presence and work challenges ongoing efforts to erase their identities, assimilate them into settler culture, and, bluntly, to continue the genocide of colonization.

APIRG stands in solidarity with all who are fighting for the return of land and sovereignty to Indigenous nations here in Amiskwaciwaskahikan, across Treaty 6 territory, and around the world. In the words of Eve Tuck and K Wayne Yang, decolonization is not a metaphor. Decolonial projects must always have Indigenous land rights and sovereignty as their aim.

About APIRG

APIRG (Alberta Public Interest Research Group) is a student-funded, student- and community- governed non-profit organization based at the University of Alberta. We provide students with resources to be active citizens, through research, education, advocacy and action. APIRGs is democratically run, independent, non-partisan, and non-profit to ensure that students are able to work on issues of importance to them without fear of censure.

Our work includes:

<u>Direct Funding</u>: we provide thousands of dollars in grants to student and community groups for their own events, projects, research and programming.

Research support: we support students engaging in community-minded research projects in disseminating their research to the public.

Workshops and training: we offer free workshops in anti-oppression, consensus-based decision-making, and other topics to student groups and non-profit organizations both independently and through the SU

<u>Events</u>: we collaborate with campus and community groups to host a variety of social and educational events throughout the year.

Our <u>Library</u>: APIRG maintains a small community library in our office in HUB Mall. It contains books, zines and other media relating to a variety of social and environmental justice issues.

Mentorship: Through Board development, our volunteer program, internships, working groups and grants, we provide support and guidance for folks as they find their own ways of being agents of change in their communities.

A Board of Directors composed of ten to twelve U of A undergraduate students and community members oversees the operations of APIRG. Dedicated staff coordinators ensure the smooth daily functioning of the organization.

APIRG is accountable directly to the people who fund it - students at the U of A. All Board meetings and general meetings are open to the public. APIRG also keeps audited financial records and produces an annual report. The Students' Union oversees APIRG's function and approves its financial documents each year. Our AGM is held every October and you're invited!

Where did APIRG come from?

Public Interest Research Groups (PIRGs) were first organized in the 1970s, based on a model proposed by Ralph Nader, a political activist and attorney. Today these organizations are established on campuses and in communities throughout Canada and the United States.

PIRGs based at colleges and universities operate from the premise that students are citizens. Part of their education, therefore, should include recognizing and solving problems facing society. Through involvement with PIRGs, thousands of Canadian students have learned skills in consensus building, group facilitation, event organization, media production, and research. In turn, these valuable skills help them to act effectively in the public interest.

Each PIRG is different and reflects the priorities of students on its campus. In Western Canada, PIRGs are active at the Universities of Lethbridge, Regina, British Columbia, Northern British Columbia, Victoria, and Simon Fraser University. There are numerous other PIRGs operating in Ontario, Quebec, and Nova Scotia.

In a campus-wide undergraduate referendum held in March 2001, a majority voted in favour of creating a Public Interest Research Group at the University of Alberta. This was preceded and followed by years of student organizing. APIRG was born of hundreds of students dreaming of and defending their right to a campus organization which serves their need for political education and engagement

How is APIRG funded?

Undergraduates contribute \$1.75 - \$3.50 in Fall and Winter semesters in 2017/2018 to APIRG when they pay their tuition. The student fee provides APIRG with stable funding, allowing working groups to focus our energy on the issues we care about. Student funding allows APIRG to maintain independence from other institutions and focus on representing students' interests as citizens. Any student who is unable to or does not wish to support APIRG is entitled to opt out at the start of each semester and have this fee fully refunded.

Basis of Unity

We believe the way to create positive social change is to provide individuals with the information and tools they need to become active citizens and to participate effectively in their communities.

Statement of Values

APIRG considers an equitable environment to be a part of positive social change. We acknowledge that social change is achievable and see social awareness as a valuable facet of the public interest. We see anti-oppression as a process that acknowledges the existence of systemic oppression (including, but not limited to, racism, sexism, homophobia, transphobia, classism, and ableism). Through practices and policies, we seek to actively identify, challenge and address oppression wherever it exists, in all its various forms, and to actively encourage opportunities for social awareness and change. Further, we recognize and respect that systems of oppression interact in different ways and affect each person differently.

APIRG Funding

We offer grants ranging from \$150-\$4000 to student and community groups working on community building, action, research, and education in th public interest! Learn more at apirg.org/funding.



settlers love to possess to define relationships in terms of a hierarchy in which they are on top


they say our indigenous people our immigrants our land

by which they mean the fee simple land privately owned by them and their husbands


