

OUR MANDATE

APIRG is a student-run, student-funded, non-profit organization dedicated to research, education, advocacy, and action in the public interest. APIRG exists to provide students with resources to be active citizens.

STATEMENT OF VALUES

AWOL 2022

The dinner featured food from a local family-owned restaurant and was an opportunity for students and community members to gather and enjoy a warm meal together at no cost.

Halt The Hike

In response to continued rising tuition costs, student organizers planned a rally in opposition to proposed tuition hikes. APIRG Board members and Staff come out to the rally in solidarity and stand firmly in support of the student-led protests in opposition to continued tuition increases.

Learn to Screenprint

During AWOL, local artist and community builder Veronica Fuentes shared her knowledge about screenprinting with APIRG Staff and workshop attendees. It was a very well-received workshop and students voiced interest in having more opportunities to learn about screen-printing! Screenprinting has historically been a way for social and political movements to gain visibility. It's a low-tech tool with powerful impacts and a long history in political movements.

On February 23rd, we held a drop-in screen-printing session where attendees printed their own APIRG tote bag or t-shirt and helped to screen-print our logo on a tablecloth that we repurposed for tabling throughout the rest of the semester!

HALT THE HIKE STATEMENT

"APIRG unequivocally supports the student-led Halt The Hike protests, and joins students across the campus community, Alberta, so-called Canada and the world in solidarity with one voice: It is time to end tuition fees once and for all!

High quality, universally accessible post-secondary learning is necessary for a healthy and free society, and is easily affordable in cooperation between levels of government. Education has become entirely unaffordable for the vast majority of students, which has and will cause lasting damage to the long term economic and social wellbeing of everyone: whether they have received a post-secondary education or not.

All of us students are being faced with an impossible choice when entering school: Accept many 10's of thousands of dollars of crushing debt at unpayable interest rates for which we will never be able to repay, or accept insecure low wage jobs without any hope for housing or any economic security. It is not a choice we will accept making anymore. Free education, or we march!

APIRG will continue to support any and all student-led organizing to fight against tuition increases anywhere."

REFERENDUM CAMPAIGN 13

APIRG is funded through a small, optional undergraduate student fee. Every 5 years the student body votes to affirm that they would like to continue funding APIRG through this fee. In March 2022 we ran a plebiscite campaign in the SU election to continue our student fee. Unfortunately, for the first time in our 20 year history on campus we were unsuccessful in securing the student vote.

In March 2023 we ran a referendum campaign to reinstate our student fee and were successful in securing our optional student fee for the next four years.


